

ARTISTS INSPIRED BY ASIA is organized and produced by Amy Sophia Marashinsky, Marlene Pitkow and Deena Burton, three artists who have lived and studied performing arts in Japan, India, and Indonesia, respectively. This festival represents their commitment to those cultures.

The BALI-JAVA DANCE THEATRE is a cooperative project of artists dedicated to introducing American audiences to the performing arts of Indonesia, as well as experimenting creatively with these forms.
