Gamelan Son of Lion is a new music repertory ensemble specializing in contemporary pieces written for the instruments of the Javanese gamelan percussion orchestra. A Javanese gamelan consists of a basic group of metallophones (xylophones), knobbed gongs and drums, supplemented by voices and other instruments. The metal instruments are tuned in two unique non-western scales called *slendro* and *pelog*, and were built in Indonesian village style by Barbara Benary using steel keys, cans, hubcaps, etc.

The ensemble is a group of composers and performers who have been developing repertoire for these instruments over the past 20 years, influenced both by traditional music of Java and Bali and by contemporary compositional styles of New York City, which is the ensemble's home base. The gamelan and its sub-group Rockland Angklung Society also perform annually in various venues in Rockland County. Wayang Kulit is the name for the indigenous shadow puppet theatre of Indonesia. This form of theatre dates from many centuries ago and until recently served the purpose of public entertainment in the absence of radio, television and cinema. Traditionally a wayang kulit performance is done outdoors or in the entryway to a house or ceremonial building, by torch light at night. Stories unfold slowly, beginning around 9pm and lasting until sunrise. The puppets are made from buffalo hide parchment, and are ornately carved in a unique form of stylized art. They represent ancestors and supernaturals, and are not meant to be realistic. Shadow plays may be taken from folklore or from the ancient epics of India, Ramayana and Mahabharata. The puppets may also be used for other stories, as we have here called upon them to tell the story of Esther.
