Kecapi Strings and Clarinet by Lisa Karrer

Tonight's version premieres a projected video sequence created by visual artist Jenny Lynn McNutt, with text fragments by the Batak poet Sitor Situmorang (arranged by Ms. Karrer).

Bamboo Harem by Lisa Karrer

In this brief excerpt from "Woman's Song..." bamboo angklung rattles are used as wayang shadow puppets to represent concubines in the 17th century court of Wiroguno, the Tumenggung (Governor) of a region in Java, Indonesia.

Wayang kulit is a traditional Javanese theatre form using carved, flat leather puppets and accompanied by gamelan. Plays may be traditional epic stories or spinoff stories inventing new situations for the traditional characters of Ramayana or Mahabharata. This play is of the latter genre, bridging the seasonal holidays. "Hantu Hancur" is our Indonesian translation of "Ghostbusters"

Sekat by I. M. Harjito

An innovative piece for gamelan and Scottish highland bagpipe by the director of the Wesleyan University and New York Indonesian Consulate Javanese gamelan groups. In this chamber rendition the bagpipe part is played by clarinet (chanter) and viola (drones). The title is a play on words; the form of the composition is based on traditional sekaten, an ancient ceremonial gamelan type, phoenetically similar to "Scot."

ABOUT THE GAMELAN

Since 1976 Gamelan Son of Lion has performed and presented programs of new works for the instruments of the Javanese gamelan percussion orchestra in the greater New York area, and has toured internationally. The ten person composers' collective performs on metallophones (xylophones), knobbed gongs and drums, supplemented by voices and other instruments. The metal instruments are tuned in two unique non-western scales called *slendro* and *pelog*, and are built in Indonesian village style using steel keys, cans and hubcaps, together with traditional drums and gongs.
