The Unraveling by David Simons

The combined 10 note scale of pelog and slendro tunings intertwines like DNA strands. The bonang, played like a reyong, is in pelog and all the other instruments are slendro. The balance between the two pitch worlds unravels, as does the intricate lattice-work of rhythms, to the point where we hear the reverse engineering. The unraveling of the composer....and the performer.....and the archivist. With lots of incense. When you are led by the hand to a sacrificial ceremony.

Reconciliation Dance by Jody Kruskal

Written for a production of Midsummernight's Dream, this arrangement uses the slendro instrument tuning with violin and viola.

Tango by Barbara Benary, with dance by Deena Burton

A useful piece of music that has seen many incarnations: first sung onstage by an irate Greek goddess, later danced by Queen Esther as a shadow puppet to seduce her king. Now only one question remains: does it really take two to tango?

Seven by Paul Hogan

This piece explores the sometimes blurry relationship of improvised and composed music.

Nine-Eleven: a collective response to the World Trade disaster. Theme by Barbara Benary; variations and interludes by Laura Liben, Daniel Goode, David Simons and David Demnitz

Gamelan Son of Lion has been performing and presenting new music in the greater New York area since 1976. We are a new music repertory ensemble and composers' collective based in downtown New York City, specializing in contemporary pieces written for the instruments of the Javanese gamelan percussion orchestra. Our gamelan, built in Indonesian village style by Barbara Benary using steel keys, cans, hubcaps, etc. along with traditional drums and gongs, is tuned in the traditional slendro and pelog scales. Gamelan Son of Lion has premiered over a hundred new compositions by American and international composers in various contemporary styles, and has toured in Indonesia, Canada and New Zealand. The ensemble also presents traditional music of Java and Bali, wayang kulit shadow puppetry and Indonesian dance. Our music can e heard on CD's New Gamelan New York, Gamelan as a Second Language and Bending the Gending, as well as various audio and video cassettes available from the ensemble or from American Gamelan Institute at www.gamelan.org
