

Laura Andel was born and grew up in Buenos Aires, Argentina. She moved to Boston in 1993 to pursue studies in composition. She has focused mainly on composing for large ensembles and using conduction as part of the compositional process. In 2000, she moved to NYC and created the Laura Andel Orchestra, featuring an unusual combination of instruments and uniting musicians from diverse musical and cultural backgrounds. Andel has received grants, commissions, and awards for her work from BMI Foundation, Jerome Foundation, Unesco-Aschberg, Rockefeller Foundation, AMC, Massachusetts Cultural Council, NYS Music Fund, and the Senate for Culture, Berlin. She has been a fellow at residencies such as Bellagio, Sacatar, Valparaiso, Yaddo, MacDowell, Music Omi, Ucross Foundation, Millay Colony, and Blue Mountain Center. Currently, she leads the Laura Andel Orchestra in several formations. Her recordings include "Doble Mano" (Rossbin Records), "SomnambulisT" (Red Toucan), and "In::Tension" (Rossbin).

PROGRAM NOTES

Apsides

Apsis Astronomy. The point of greatest or least distance of the orbit of a celestial body from a center of attraction. Either of two points on the orbit of a planet or satellite that are nearest to or furthest from the body around which it moves.

Apsides is a site specific work originally created to perform at St. Marks Church in New York City and features the use of space and movement. Apsides focuses on the sound quality generated by each apsis. There are multiple apsides within the piece (Gamelan ensemble, Fender Rhodes, cornet, and conductor) which intersect at different points and latitudes. The cornet is the center of attraction, and symbolically, it gets near to or furthest away from each point. Cornet orbits in space and plays with the proximity and contrast of sounds generated by each sonic apsis.

Umbral

Umbral is derived from the Latin *umbra*, meaning "shadow". It is also the Spanish word for "threshold." The minimum amount of signal that is needed for a system to detect it, or the level in which a stimulus generates a nervous impulse.

Algol

Algol is a variable star or star system, regarded as the prototype of eclipsing binary stars. **Binary star** A system of two stars in which one star revolves around the other or both revolve around a common center. **Binary system** A star system containing two stars orbiting around each other.

Algol is a variable star or star system in the constellation Perseus, regarded as the prototype of eclipsing binary stars. Viewed from Earth, Algol varies its brightness over a period of 2.9 days, with the changes caused by a pair of stars periodically passing in front of each other and so cutting out the other's light. The larger of the two stars is losing material to its small companion, the gas forming a tenuous disc around the smaller star. Ancient Arabians noticed its clear variation in brightness. They thought there was something strange about it and named it "al Ghul", the Demon star. The Algol System is also known as the The Winking Demon Star.
