Beleganjur: Prelude to Life Lived

Beleganjur (or balaganju) is a Balinese genre of parade music with gongs and drums.

This version also incorporates the flute and tuned rattles called angklung.

Eine Kleine Gamelan Music/Nacht Music

Goode's composition is a structured improv in which any tonal material may mix.

The string composition for which it is named jmps in as well, in gamelan tuning.

Gineman Traditional Balinese

From the repertoire of Gamelan Angklung, a set of instruments in the slendro mode with only four notes.

Abweja Skip LaPlante

The name, like the music, is a composite of world music sources: **Abwe** for Zimbabwe, whose marimba instruments are represented by homemade cardboard tubes, and **Ja** for Java, home of gamelan instruments

Claudius Smith Denman Maroney

A recounting of the legend of a Revolutionary War villain of the Ramapo mountains. Video by Lisa Karrer, vocalists Sheila Schonbrun and Lisa Karrer.

Tetabeuhan Sungut (Onomatopoeia) Slamet Sjukur

Javanese composer Sjukur uses a vocal technique combining the sounds of the drums, gongs, and chanting to create a spoken gamelan
